The play is set in Britain, on Saturday 28 May 1988, where the Conservative party is in power under Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher. After five days of controversial political debate in parliament about Local Government Act 'Section 28' – which restricted local authorities from promoting homosexuality – Conservative politician Robin Hesketh has returned home to the

idyllic Cotswold house he shares with his wife of 30 years, Diana.

Robin unwinds from his week in parliament and they prepare for friends arriving for lunch. But we see all is not as blissful as it seems. Diana has a stinking hangover, a fox is destroying the garden, and secrets are being dug up all over the place. As the day draws on, what starts as gentle ribbing and the familiar rhythms of marital scrapping quickly turns to blood-sport.

Olivier Award-winners, Lindsay Duncan and Alex Jennings play Diana and Robin Hesketh in this witty and devastating portrait of the governing class.
